





# SOME HISTORY OF SQUARE DANCING IN THE SAN FERNANDO VALLEY

In some conversations I have had with Wendell Langman over the past two or three years, it became apparent that he had a wealth of local square dancing history in his head, along with a good memory, so I asked him if he would

write it down for the benefit of the Valley Trailers members whose experience doesn't extend back to the heyday of the activity in our area. He graciously agreed to do so, and here is his report. - Editor

Square dancing began in the San Fernando Valley in 1890 by farm families from the Midwest (hence the much later Farmers & Charmers). The first modern club, the "Saddleites", began in Canoga Park in 1958 and had 120 members at their peak. There was modern square dancing in the SFV as early as 1948, but the late '50s and '60s was the most popular era.

In 1988, Elaine's (now Granada Pavilion) was operating seven nights a week and until just recently was home for Ron Yanke, Cindy Mower, and John Michaelson doing rounds. Boot Hill (in Van Nuys), owned by the Lavins, was the mecca for apparel.

Other clubs in the Valley around that time were Fun Level Squares (Reseda), Valley Steppers, New Haulers (Newhall), Valley Whirlers (Don Carter), Square Crows (Floyd Davis), San Fernando Bucks & Does, Knotheads, Sage Brush Swingers, Dudes & Dolls, Las Caudrills, Gadabouts, Valley Hoedowners, Bar None Club, Jack's Kings & Queens, Jack's Jokers, and the Y-Knot Twirlers. A bit later than the above. these other clubs came on the scene: Star Lighters, Stem Winders, Moonlighters, Northridge B&Bs, Twisters & Blisters (Van Nuys), Rocky Tops, Silver Dollars, Woodstackers in Granada Hills, and Ray and Donna Rose's Double R Squares at the Barn in North Hollywood, a hall built especially for dancing by Roy & Jane McDonald in 1959. It burned down about 10 (?) years ago. The Glendale B&Bs recently shut down after 48 years.

Some other callers of the time located in the valley, but not noted above: Benny M Hall, Chuck Hill, Lillian Gottshalk, George Burton, Jack & Pat Thomas, Richard (Doc) Tullar, George Elliot, Bill Saunders, Woody Woodpecker(!), Dick Wilson, and Jack Pepper.

Later and current callers in the valley include Mike Seastrom, Michael Kellogg, Clyde Driver, Dale Hoppers, Paul Waters, Arlen Miller, Lloyd Lewis, and Dick Hodnefield and Don Schadt from Simi Valley. Most active in the Valley after the boom times of the '50s and '60s were primarily Mike Seastrom, Marty Firstenberg, Larry Ward (B Sharps), and John Reitmajer (Hay Shakers), and many visiting callers. The big dances of the time included the annual Catalina dance, and the largest indoor dance was held at the LA Sports arena in 1959 with 24 callers.

Deanne and I began danc-

ing with the Ramblin' Roques (Mission Viejo) in 1969; three years later she and I, with a few other couples, formed the Shipmates in San Juan Capistrano. We were Admiral and wife, aka presidents, in 1972, and I think we may have held the largest outdoor dance ever with two bands and over 1200 dancers at Doheny Beach, preceded by a parade and floats in San Juan Capistrano. After that we moved to Oregon and gave up dancing.

Most instrumental in our return to dancing in the SFV were Larry Ward and John Reitmajer, both of whom passed away within days of each other in January of 2014. "Gentleman John" and "Liberace" (Larry), with his white fur coat, white boots, and necklaces, were always a hit. Larry had more stories (of questionable validity) than Mark Twain. He formed the B-Sharps in 1962 and claimed 5000 members. The last time we saw Larry (he



had relocated to Reno), he claimed to have 150 dancers in his class there and had a deal with the "Ohio Symphony" and some movie company to make a movie of his life. Larry was a big promoter of the weekend events he originated, including Cayucos (still going strong every August with Jet and Joe), as well as Big Bear, Mammoth, and others, and they were always great fun. But we really learned how to square dance from Gentleman John, whom we miss very much, but are happy to have young and vibrant Buddy Weaver every Wednesday.

## A DAY OF ADVANCED DANCING

Saturday, June 29th, was the fifth Saturday in the month, and as usual for this day the Valley Trailers sponsored an Advanced dance, However, this time there was more, an Advanced workshop in the afternoon which seemed to be appreciated and enjoyed by those who attended. The caller for both the afternoon event and the dance that night was Ken Ritucci, who although being from the east coast, gets out this way fairly regularly. There were four squares for the afternoon session and six for most of the evening dance, not too bad considering that we were competing with a C2 dance in Newhall in the afternoon and the Foothill Frolic in West Covina all day. These Advanced dances don't normally have a star tip for lack of enough dancers to get a square at that level, but this time there were enough for a C1 tip, and Ken included many of the calls and some of the concepts on the C1 list. Ken provided a very nice day of Advanced dancing.


For the afternoon workshop, Ken opened it up to requests for any calls that people wanted to review, and he had several takers for his offer. However, the call that he worked the most was one

apparently initiated by him, and that was Chain Reaction starting from a left-handed setup. Chain Reaction is a relatively simple call, and is one of the first ones to be taught in any A1 class, but dancers seem to have a lot of trouble with it when starting from a left-handed formation, and there are at least three reasons for this. One is that it is not often called from this formation, and it does feel quite different from when starting from a right-handed setup, although the definition is unchanged. Another is that most dancers don't know the definition of the call. And third is that it involves one of the most difficult things in all of square dancing, one that Don Schadt often emphasizes in the Tuesday night beginners' class, and that is "wait." If the two dancers on the points who are looking at someone's back at the start don't wait for their partner to complete a pass thru, the square is guaranteed to crash and burn. The same requirement is there when doing the call from a right-handed setup, but the dancers have done it that way so often that they just go by habit and muscle memory and complete the call successfully (usually) with no one ever knowing that they did it wrong. Ken expressed some disappointment when, even after all of his workshopping, people still weren't doing the call successfully when he called it in the evening dance.

The workshop was a beneficial and enjoyable addition to

the usual fifth Saturday night dance, and Ken was an excellent choice of caller for it. The Valley Trailers would do well to make this their standard practice whenever the caller and the hall are available to support it. Ken expressed an interest in supporting this whenever it could be worked out, and the VT would do well to take him up on it. Currently Buddy Weaver's Wednesday night class and workshop and fourth Friday dance, and the Phantom Squares' second Friday dance, are about the only Advanced dancing opportunities available in the Valley, and this would be an excellent way to expand on that.

A few weeks ago, we drove out to the Cowtown Square Dance Center in Riverside for an afternoon workshop and evening dance. It was 85 miles from Northridge, which is farther then we usually go to go square dancing, but we had never been to this hall before, so were curious about it, plus the caller was one of our favorites who doesn't get to southern California very often, so off we went. The thermometer inside the car that shows the outside temperature read 113 degrees as we approached Riverside, but the A/C was working fine so it wasn't a problem until we needed to get out of the car. The A/C in the hall also worked fine, but it wasn't turned on until less than an hour before the workshop started, so it was rather warm for a while.

The building was a large, nice

hall that was quite a way from downtown Riverside, pretty much out in the country. We were told that originally it was a barn that had been refurbished to be a dance hall. The excellent hardwood floor was said to have come from the lanes of a bowling alley that had been taken down. The hall was large; we were dancing three squares across, and could have easily gone to four if needed, and the floor was at least twice as long as it was wide, so could have accommodated well over 30 squares. The hall is very nicely done, so if you ever have the opportunity to go dancing there, don't miss it.



We enjoyed the event, and the caller easily lived up to our expectations, but our enthusiasm was dampened a bit by the fact that we never had more than four squares, and only three for part of the time, so we spent the time dancing with a lot of the same people, even though cards were used to mix us up. Unfortunately, this seems to be a common and continuing thing with square dancing these days, and it isn't getting any better. More participation by current dancers would help the financial aspect of things, but even that would only be temporary. For square dancing to survive for the long term, and even thrive, more new dancers is the only way it will happen, and I'm not sure that that is very likely. It just doesn't seem to appeal to the younger generations who have all of the modern technology to entertain them, and don't seem to care about, or even be aware of, the effects of the lack of physical activity and even minimal mental stimulation.

I fear that the current trend isn't going to change, and there isn't a lot we can do about it. But we all can do a little bit. and that starts with convincing your friends, neighbors, relatives, your children, your grandchildren, to come to our new dancer class starting this month (September). If even one quarter of our current active members were to bring someone, or even better a couple, we would have a significant sized class this fall. Think about what you can do.





#### COWABUNGA VISITATION

How many people had heard the word "Cowabunga"? I hadn't before seeing the flyer put out by "Farmers" for their August dance. They said it had to do with "surfing" (ocean surfing, not web surfing). Going with the COW theme, they served ice cream with a variety of toppings. Veggies, fruit and cookies added to the repast.

Europeans are taught the dance by definition method and dance to the most modern music.

Simple calls such as "Load the Boat" proved to be puzzling when the formation at the start of the call was foreign to many. Suffice it to say, Soren offered the European way of cueing the call after seeing

every square breaking down. Sue Cohen thought the cue words "pass, ass, turn, pass were hilarious. The Advanced tip proved to be just as challenging, but just know that Soren is the top C-1 caller in Europe.

It was pointed out that four students from the Valley Trailers' Tuesday night Plus class did extremely well considering the circumstances. Francine Golden, Marvin Schlossman, Nancy Zavisch, and Bill Drowatzky's gutsy accomplishment at every Plus tip demonstrated that the VT class format is working the way square dancing should be taught.

Thirty-seven members of the Ramblin' Rogues took the long two-hour bus ride to Thousand Oaks for their official club visitation. ## MAINSTREAM A SQUARE D REPORT




