
November 2016 A New Face For Valley Trailers




Oops!
















49th Anniversary Dance

Social Justice

Social justice. That's what our topic of discussion was at the last ASquareD board meeting in Hawthorne that I attend each month. We had a detailed dialog of what exactly is social justice. The conversation was about tolerance, fairness, equality, and consideration. board members had differing thoughts about what this means and how we can apply these interpretations to square dancing. It was a good discussion, and one that I brought to my district meeting last month. Some of the delegates were uncertain as to how social justice applies to square dancing. We talked a bit and all agreed that social justice is simply being polite and respectful to each other, whether in squares, in line waiting to get a snack, or when the club president is announcing activities. The discussion was a brief one and at the time, as district director, I thought the discussion was sufficient

and I moved on to the next topic on the agenda. However, because of my dance experience this past month, I have come to realize that this topic must continue to be considered and discussed.

I attended two club dances recently and at both of these, people walked out of squares. They had their reasons, I'm sure, but was that respectful, considerate, or fair? At a second dance I attended that same weekend, a very seasoned dancer velled at another dancer from an adjacent square when he was asked to move his square so that her square could have a little more room at a very jam-packed dance. At yet another club dance, two people left an already established square. Those remaining almost didn't get enough people to form another square, but eventually they did. After the tip, I asked the people who left if they had been dancing long, hoping that they were new dancers who hadn't been informed of square dance etiquette, but no, they said they had been dancing for several years. I told them it's inconsiderate to walk out of a square. The man, with a rather nasty attitude, began to justify why they walked out of the square. He told me that one of the dancers in the square he left had clawed his partner's hand and hurt her in a previous tip, that one of the dancers was really bad, that another dancer who was learning the opposite po-

sition was really poor, that dancing with these people wasn't something he wanted to do, and that under circumstances such as these it's OK to leave a square. I was furious! Privately I asked the caller if leaving a square was ever acceptable in this area of Los Angeles. He laughed and said, "It's never OK anywhere to leave a square". As I was talking with the caller, this "nasty man" approached me again to justify his bad Several tips latbehavior. er, the president of the club came up to me to apologize for what happened and much to my amazement, there was "nasty man" again at my side to justify his actions, except now he was blaming me for him leaving a square. Yes, he started to blame me. which I thought was hilarious since he was the one who walked out of the square. not me. In another tip, same dance, same night, a dancer yelled at my partner because he was helping her and she felt she didn't need the help. Wow – what a night, and I'm leaving lots of other stuff out!!

To wrap this up – dancers, please be nice to each other. Please be considerate and understanding of others. If a dancer "claws" your hand, gently ask him or her to be more careful. It will help that dancer, who probably wasn't aware of what he or she had done, and make it more pleasant for every-

Getting to K now (Jub Members Better

I was asked to write something about myself, and after careful thought, I decided to write about something I was involved in that has had an influence on everyone's life today.

My educational background is in mechanical engineering, electrical engineering, technical illustration, technical writing, and design drafting. Late in the 1960s while I was in college, I worked for a company called Advanced Communications located here in Chatsworth, I worked directly with the engineering department drawing schematics and printed circuit boards for command destruct receivers. One day I was called to a meeting in engineering and was asked, "Can you draw the exact waveforms generated by an oscilloscope?" I replied that I could. The waveforms that I drew were words used for the very first voice synthesizer. These words were "Belly out of boron."

A presentation was made to the Air Force. The concept was that a pilot, while in a dogfight, could be warned of problems with his aircraft by voice through his headset in lieu of flashing lights. The Air Force thought it was a great idea and Advanced Communications was contracted to develop the "Aural Warning System." In those days, even with integrated circuits, the device was the size of a suitcase. Today you can hold it in your hand. So when you hear the words "Recalculating," think of me.

Continued from page 11 one else. If you think you're in a "bad" square, don't walk away - make the best of it. The tip will end soon enough and you can have something to talk about later, or feel good about yourself because you helped someone less skilled than yourself. I haven't broached the subject of presetting squares but that's for another article, though I have brought up this subject before. Square dancing is a wonderful activity for so many reasons. Let's keep it fun, safe, friendly, and respectful.

Troll caution: Some clubs have dubbed veteran dancers as trolls, meaning dancers who pester ladies by dominating their time dancing, asking for phone numbers, and encouraging them to accompany them to other clubs' classes. While it's important for new dancers to dance with a variety of partners and experience other instructors and callers, they should not cave in to the pressure of some of these people. It's important for Valley Trailers to be welcoming all the time to all dancers at class and at our dances. We're a great club with wonderful people. Let's show how generous we are by being inclusive and considerate.

I have wondered from time to time why there is such a large variation in how much time it takes different people to get to the point of being able to square dance reasonably well. Some people go through Mainstream and Plus classes in nine months, or twelve months, and then can go to club level dances and do reasonably well. Others go through a Mainstream class two or three times and still struggle with it, and there isn't necessarily an obvious difference in intellect among the people in these two categories. Of course I'm sure that it is a continuum across the distribution of learning speeds, and not just two distinct groups at each end of the distribution, but it is the end members that are the most visible, and that is what prompted me to be thinking about the topic.

It occurs to me that there is a situation similar to this in

the study of mathematics at the high school level. Some students go from Algebra 1 to advanced placement calculus in four years, make good grades, and enjoy the learning experience. Others struggle with pre-algebra, take it only because they need it in order to graduate, hate the ordeal, and are pleased to escape with a barely passing grade. So is there a correlation between ability to learn to square dance and an aptitude for mathematics? You could not conclude that from anything we've said here so far, but I often hear people say that people with backgrounds in fields such as engineering, mathematics. and physics tend to be better dancers who are more likely to go on to higher levels of the activity. Presuming this conjecture to be true, is it the case then that people attracted to these fields of study are more apt to have an aptitude for learning to square dance. or is it the case that having completed technical studies in areas such as these is helpful for learning to dance?

Out of curiosity, I did a Google search on "square dance mathematics," and was surprised at the number of hits that came back on the subject. I spent a fair amount of time reading through some of them, and found it to be quite interesting. I think based on what is in the literature on the subject, it would be safe to say that there is a high positive correlation between a love of and aptitude for

mathematics and aptitude for learning square dancing easily and being able to see the formations and apply the definitions quickly, especially at the higher levels. And this really shouldn't be surprising. Math has its structures, symmetry, axioms, theorems, and rules, and is basically about problem solving. Square dancing, especially at the higher levels, is all about rules, concepts, definitions, and quick, on-the-fly application of these to problem solving.

Here are links to two of the articles that came back from the Google search. The first http://articles.chione cagotribune.com/2007-12-10/news/0712090194 1 square-dancing-squareroots-math-whizzes. This is an article that appeared in the Chicago Tribune a few years ago about a senior math major at a college near Chicago who signed up for a class titled Mathematics of Square Dancing. She took a ribbing from her friends when they heard about it, but she came to realize that there really are a lot of mathematical concepts used in square dancing. This is a fun, easy read, and I recommend reading it to anyone with any interest in either math or square dancing.

er reading. The link takes you to a paper titled The Art of Square Dancing: Math in Motion, which was written as a Senior Honors Thesis at the same college referenced in the previous link. It starts out with a basic overview of square dancing and its background, and then proceeds into some mathematical developments about the movement of dancers in a square. If you have never been exposed to abstract algebra, you're likely to conclude that much of the article is written in Greek, but if you do have even a little background in that field, I think you will find it to be a very well done and detailed work. If this interests you at all, then I recommend that you start reading at the beginning and continue to whatever point you may get bogged down in the math, and end up with a new appreciation for a branch of mathematics that is known for not having a large number of real-world applications.

My conclusion from all of this is that, yes, there is a definite correlation between having an aptitude for math and having an interest and aptitude for square dancing. Of course this doesn't mean that if you didn't do all that well in your math classes, that you won't do well with square dancing, but just that it may not come as quickly and eas-

ily as it may for others. It may also mean that you shouldn't aspire to become a Challenge level dancer. Or it may be that my conclusion is just plain wrong. In any event, you should get out there and go for whatever level of dancing you enjoy most.

Our Plus Class Graduates and New Club Members

These are the graduates of the Plus class of September 2016. We are proud that all seven graduates have decided to become Valley Trailers members.

It is important to note the learning process they all went through to get to this point in square dancing. First, each new dancer is paired up with an experienced club dancer at each class. Ideally this "angel" knows the definitions of the calls and can explain each call to his or her assigned student during breaks as needed. Each square a student is placed in has at least three other angels with the same credentials.

The students have about 24 weeks with 1-1/2 hours each week to learn the calls and become capable of dancing at a club level dance.

Students are encouraged to attend club dances when they are ready. The angels, as well as other club members, are encouraged to invite the new dancers into their squares at dances. This helps the experienced dancers get to know the new dancers and introduce them to other club members. The new dancers can have a positive experience and will be

motivated to continue dancing with the club.

Thank you to our Plus Coordinators for a great job in putting the time and energy into helping our students really learn the basics and not graduating them before they are truly ready. You're doing a great job!





My only square dancing during the past month was at Lufupa Camp in the Okavango Delta of Botswana. The tour leader had never heard of square dancing. 



