

## Vice Presidents' Notes






All in all, the two host clubs had a very successful June club dance, thanks to Mike and Cindy and of course, the participation of the Valley Trailers.

About 30 years ago, the Valley Trailers were not in good shape, a fun loving and happy group they were, yet the club was short

on finances, so short in fact that the club members had to do a collection before the dance to pay for the caller and cuer. All of those hard times are behind us now, and one of the reasons is Carl's suggestion to invest what little excess assets we had into some kind of a savings plan (that was his business). The Valley Trailers followed his plan, and It worked.

I personally was not a member at that time, as I only go back to 1994, but I remember at the board meetings, when I attended, the growth of the fund was always a topic of discussion. So here we are now, one of the premier square dance clubs around, and maybe in a small way, but defiantly a solid way, Carl put us where we are now.

Now think funny. Back around the turn of the century, at our Buellton campout skit about well known celebrities and actors, the participants were getting their act together behind a makeshift curtain, and my wife, Carole, was given the task of being May West, who was known for her buxom body. Carl was backstage getting his stuff together and was noticing with curious eyes how Carole had grown in her upper torso, and his eyes were glued to this magnificent body. # **Recruiting New Dancers**

[Roy and Sandy recently returned from a square dance cruise where Jerry Gilbreath was one of the featured callers. This article is Roy's report on what he learned in his conversations with Jerry. Editor]

The most pressing question among square dance clubs these days is how to increase the influx of new dancers each year. Well, look no further than what caller Jerry Gilbreath of Albuquerque, NM, has developed for his club, the Duke City Singles & Doubles.

The results that Jerry has achieved are startling! His 25-week Mainstream class, which began in September of 2016, started with 51 students. When the students had to start paying in the third week, it dropped to 47. At the end, 39 graduated and 38 became members.

How was he able to achieve such a significant result in square dancing? To begin with, his class goes from 6:30 to 8 PM for 25 weeks. The class is taught using the "dance by definition," or DBD method. The weekly club dances follow on the same night after the class has concluded. After the class members have achieved an appropriate level of proficiency,

they are invited to dance the first tip of the evening, which is limited to class level, and are integrated with veteran members of the club. After the first tip, they are free to stay and watch and socialize, or go home. The normal evening schedule is alternating tips as the Valley Trailers do.

Upon graduation, they become members if thev choose to join the club. They must then dance for an additional six months in the Mainstream tips before they are allowed to take the Plus Jerry has a strong class. conviction that newbies must show proficiency in Mainstream before continuing on to the Plus level. He believes the present-day problem besetting square dancing is the "inverted pyramid," meaning that nowadays there are more weak Advanced dancers than there are Mainstream dancers.

Judging by his success, perhaps it's time for the square dance world to really consider going back to the way it used to be.

# Getting to Know Club Members Better

We met 37 years ago while we were both guest starring on a TV show. I thought he was a sleaze ball with his thick hair all slicked down and he thought I was a Hollywood starlet only interested in guys driving fancy cars. Little did we know that two years later we would be married.

We kept our marriage a secret from both our families. While we were dating, Richard, being of Japanese descent, caused my parents grave concern and displeasure. They had lived through the Japanese invasion in China and the memories of the atrocities committed by the Japanese during wartime colored my parents' perception of the Japanese race. It didn't matter that Richard was born in Long Beach and was totally American. He even hated sushi! He was still "The Japa-

nese" to my father. My mother would call me once a week to make sure that I hadn't been killed by the "wildman" (Richard). Besides, if the marriage didn't work out, we could get a divorce and no one would be the wiser. We finally informed everyone seven months later and my parents came to accept and love Richard. We bought a house, started a family, and took care of my aunt who had come from Taiwan to live with us, so life was very full and busy and the years flew by. Along the way, we had a beautiful daughter who is now Deputy Director, City Energy Project for the NRDC (National Resources Defense Council, a non-profit international environmental advocacy group headquartered in New York City).

When the drought started to affect Lake Castaic, where we used to fish whenever we could, we took up dancing. It was fortuitous that I leafed through a Pierce College extension course booklet and noticed six-week ballroom dance classes being offered. We took four ballroom classes and Richard didn't like them at all. The following year, I noticed a country western dance class taught by Linda Goldstein that had country western dancing and line dancing. We enrolled and it opened up a whole new world to us. Richard loved line dancing. For our graduation six weeks later. Linda introduced us to the Cowboy Palace, a country-western place where they taught line dancing, country-western two-step, and west coast swing on three different nights followed by dancing to a live band. We really enjoyed going there for those classes and dancing an hour afterwards to the live music.

My aunt had onset of dementia by this time and was ailing, so the two and a half hours of dancing each of those nights was a great stress relief for us. We met Linda Curtis there (another Linda!) who told us about square dancing. We went to an introductory dance and were truly impressed by how friendly all the people were. Sadly, the place was just too far for us to join the club. Then Linda suggested round dancing. She explained that it was choreographed ballroom dancing in the round. We tried it and loved it.

My aunt passed away in the summer of 2015. In September of that year, we started square dance classes. After graduating from Farmers and Charmers, many square dancers that we knew suggested taking other classes to improve even more so that we would be more confident when we started going to dances. We completed one class with Don Schadt, of the Valley Trailers Club, who made the class so fun and instructive that we were totally hooked. We now dance five or six nights a week, taking

## Editor Sez

Last month in this column we talked about an article that described three habits of successful language learners, and considered whether those habits might also apply to learning to square dance. However, I hadn't done much more than list the three habits when my space allocation was used up, so the column ended with a promise to finish the thoughts next month, so here it is.

It seems that there are several parallels in learning a new language and learning to square dance. Both involve converting words into thoughts and actions, both use dictionaries, and both involve rules of syntax and grammar, although this last item mostly falls to the caller. Only the most serious student of square dancing, or the aspiring caller, will need to worry about this. But the dictionary

of definitions for the square dancer is another matter. Some students will use a dictionary quite regularly, others infrequently or not at all, and will learn to do the calls just from class and practice. Some examples of dictionaries for square dancing are the Taminations web site, Callerlab's web site, and Vic Ceder's series of Ceder Chest of Square Dance Definition books. There are others as well, but it seems that these three are the most commonly used. Vic's books are an excellent resource with lots of detail, but I find that I usually go to Taminations just because it is so quick and easy to pull up and use.

I was disappointed that the article didn't live up to my initial expectations relative to its possible application to learning to square dance when I first saw the title, but in hindsight perhaps I should have had different expectations. The approaches used to teach each are quite different, and perhaps that explains some dropout from the first day of square dance class to graduation. Formal language instruction typically involves three hours or more of class time per week, and the concomitant homework to be done outside of class. Square dancing, at least in our case, involves one hour and 15 minutes of class time per week, and no expectation of the student doing any studying outside of class. Of course, a student could

choose to do so, but I expect that few do, and there is little if any expectation on the part of the instructor or the class coordinators that they will. This is strictly for fun, and the school days with required homework are well behind most of us.

I am not familiar with foreign language programs such as Rosetta Stone, of which there are several. My experience with formal language instruction has mostly been in a classroom with two or three hours of instruction per week. I have thought for some time that a 2.5-hour class for new dancers would be a more effective approach than our current one hour and 15 minutes per week. I think that many people simply aren't able to develop a proficiency with Mainstream level dancing with an hour and 15 minutes per week of class time for five or six months. If the classes went for 2.5 hours each week with the rate of exposure to new calls kept the same as it is now and more review of the calls already taught, there would be a greater sense of "I'm getting it" for the students, and I think the dropout rate would be less. By having the same rate of exposure to new calls, but twice the class time to absorb and review them, the third habit from last month would come into play, which was re-

After 12 months of class time to cover both Mainstream and Plus, I think we would have a noticeably higher level of competency in our Plus level graduates than we have now. The drawback of this approach is that we would only have one opportunity per year for new students to start a class. As with many things in life, this is a trade-off, and one that has been made by people more knowledgeable than I about teaching square dancing, but I'm still not convinced.
